Near-Death Experiences: Life After "Death" and Credibility, a Mixed Method Design

Definitions

- Near-death experiences (NDEs) –
 characteristically include a strong positive effect,
 dissociation from the physical body, and contain
 transcendental or mystical elements.
- Credibility capacity for belief

Research Questions

- How do near-death experiences affect the quality of life of the individuals who experience them?
- How do demographics influence perceived credibility of self-reported near-death experiences?

Methodology

Three narratives of near-death experiences were examined in a qualitative meta-analysis to determine common themes.


Recipients of the survey were provided with four case studies that included narratives of near-death experiences, and the demographics of the individuals who experienced the near-death experience. Participants were then asked if they thought the narrative was credible and if the demographics influenced their response.

Abstract

The term near-death experience (NDE) encompasses a broad spectrum of experiences that typically occur when the physical body is under extreme duress or close to death. The goal of this study is to examine narratives of near-death experiences and distinguish their common themes and to examine perceived credibility of self-reported near-death experiences.

Results

Conclusion

In the phenomenological study, near-death experiences were found to positively affect the quality of the subject's life after having the near-death experience. In the survey investigating perceived credibility, religion was the most influential demographic in the credibility of self-reported near-death experiences.

Implications for Future Research

- Include a question on the survey about demographics of the participants to observe how those demographics influence the resulting data related perceived credibility.
- Clarify information in case studies to reduce participant confusion.
- Shorten survey to increase completion rate.
