
Survey method


Posted survey to following listservs and targeted email:

- Targeted email to published computational and evolutionary biologists indexed in PubMed.




Demographics: Survey Respondents (n=209)








Demographics: Survey Respondents (n=209)




Primary affiliations of respondents

Have you heard of this resource?






Have librarians/professors used a pirate site? (n=86)

Why do librarians/professors use pirate sites? (n=40 free text responses)

- Themes that emerged:
 - Ease/convenience in using pirate sites (n=15)
 - No other option (No OA, ill, response from author) (n=11)
 - No time (n=5)
 - Cost (n=4)
 - Bad interfaces or connections off-campus (n=3)
 - As form of protest against publishers (n=2)





Why do librarians/professors NOT use pirate sites? (n=129 free text responses)

- Themes that emerged:
 - I have what I need with library access (n=43)
 - ILL/emailed author for copy (n=34)
 - Trust/unethical (n=19)
 - Copyright violation (n=12)
 - Fear of malware or virus (n=11)
 - Modeling good behavior (working towards OA) (n=6)
 - Implicates institution (n=2)
 - Time to find (n=2)

Recommendations for librarians and professors

- An opportunity to discuss the scholarly publishing ecosystem with students
 - Geographic differences in access to information
 - Information privilege
 - Copyright laws
 - Retaining copyright/Open Access
 - Work to improve access and interfaces
 - Role of publishers in curating scholarship
 - The role of the university press and scholarly societies
